Choose to Read Ohio

- Floyd's Pick Book Award
 - **Hello** by Aiko Ikegami (Creston Books, 2019) has been named the sixth annual Floyd's Pick Book Award winner in memory of children's literature expert, advocate, and librarian Floyd Dickman.
 - The Floyd's Pick Book Award is given annually to a book written by an Ohio author or illustrated by an Ohio illustrator that is representative of high-quality literature created for children. It is given to carry on the legacy of Floyd Dickman's work to support and share children's literature. The Choose to Read Ohio (CTRO) Advisory Council established Floyd's Pick in December 2015 and selects the annual winner and honor books.
 - The CTRO Advisory Council has also selected three Floyd's Pick Honor Books for 2021: **The Arabic Quill** by Aya Khalil, illustrated by Anait Semirdzhyan (Tilbury House Publishers, 2020); **Go, Girls, Go!** by Frances Gilbert, illustrated by Alison Black (Beach Lane Books / Simon & Schuster, 2019); and **The Oldest Student: How Mary Walker Learned to Read** by Rita Lorraine Hubbard, illustrated by Oge Mora (Schwartz & Wade / Penguin Random House, 2020).

- The 2021 & 2022 Choose to Read Ohio (CTRO) program cycle officially kicked off in January. The [2021 & 2022 CTRO booklist](#) features 20 notable titles for all ages and reading levels. The booklist includes five books each for young children, middle grades, teens, and adults, and encompasses fiction and nonfiction and a variety of geographic and cultural interests. Ohio librarians, teachers, and other book experts help to select the biennial CTRO booklist.

- The State Library of Ohio has resumed lending materials. **Items will be available via contact-free front door pickup at the State Library on Wednesdays from 10 a.m. – 2 p.m.** The address for the State Library of Ohio is 274 E. 1st Avenue, Suite 100, Columbus, OH 43201.
 - How contact-free front door pickup works:
 - Have your library card number ready.
 - Look for the contact-free front door pickup signs posted in the parking lot and on the library door. Call the number posted on the signs: 614-560-1646.
 - Deaf or hard of hearing patrons, please text 614-560-1646.
 - Staff answering the phone will check out your items and place them inside the vestibule on the table.
 - You must wear a face covering to pick up your items inside the vestibule.
 - You will enter the vestibule and pick up your items on the table. Your items will be in a plastic bag.

- Our reference and cataloging librarians are working remotely, [responding to reference requests](#) from state employees and the general public alike. With an eye toward the future, staff are also cataloging and archiving state agency web publications regarding COVID-19.
- As the regional federal documents depository and state of Ohio documents depository, our physical collections are not accessible but our librarians are still responding to government documents-related questions.

Interlibrary Loan

- The State Library of Ohio has been selected for participation in OCLC's new Express Digital Delivery program. The selection was made due to the exceptional work of the State Library's ILL staff, who consistently deliver articles and other digital resources within 18 hours or less with an average turnaround time of 10 hours, through OCLC's WorldShare ILL network. The State Library joins an exclusive group of 1,100 libraries selected to participate in this program. OCLC Express was developed to help libraries respond to the continuing pandemic, tighter budgets, and the shift to more virtual learning. The State Library of Ohio participates in the LVIS (Libraries Very Interested in Sharing) resource group.

Library Leadership Ohio 2021

- After a successful pivot to an all-online format in 2020, Library Leadership Ohio will return in 2021, again in an all-online format. Library Leadership Ohio allows library staff from all library types around the state to define, refine, and inspire their leadership skills and potential. Additional details, including application requirements and deadlines, will be shared with the library community soon.
 - Library Leadership Ohio is a partnership between the State Library of Ohio and OhioNET and is partially supported by federal LSTA funds from the Institute of Museum and Library Services, awarded by the State Library of Ohio Board.

LSTA

- The State Library invited Ohio libraries to apply for the [2021 Celebrating Ohio Book Awards & Authors \(COBAA\) grant](#). This grant program is an opportunity for Ohio libraries to receive funds to build or expand a collection of books receiving honors and awards in Ohio and by Ohio authors. This grant initiative provides funds specifically for collection development purposes, connecting Ohio readers to Ohio authors and Ohio book award winners. This year, in its sixth iteration, the grant award is a maximum of \$2,000 per eligible institution. The application period closed on January 15, and applications are currently being reviewed.
- The State Library invited Ohio libraries to apply for the [2021 Summer Library Program \(SLP\) Grant](#). This grant program empowers libraries to enhance their 2021 SLP/SRPs with library-led activities that spark creativity and productivity, engage individuals, and benefit their communities. Libraries may apply for up to \$1,500 in federal funds to support their SLP. Libraries may use the awarded federal funds to purchase program materials, supplies, and/or contractual services for the activities offered to the community during the 2021 SLP. The application period closed on February 1, and applications are currently being reviewed.

Ohio Digital Library

- Through January 31, 2021, ODL has tallied 631,664 checkouts.

- In January 2021, ODL welcomed its newest member, [Westlake Porter Public Library](#).
- In 2020, ODL patrons checked out tallied **6,710,060** items—a record-breaking year! This is the first time in its existence that ODL has exceeded six million checkouts. In 2019, ODL's circulation was 5,628,889.
- In mid-March 2020, ODL enabled the opportunity for Ohioans to take advantage of the Overdrive [Instant Digital Card](#). A user can sign up with his/her phone number and gain quick access to e-content via ODL. Users that sign up via the Instant Digital Card will be directed to their local library to fill out a physical library card. In January 2021, 6,808 registrations took place.

Ohio Ready to Read

- The Ohio Ready to Read (ORTR) trainers have developed an online version of the popular [Early Literacy 101 workshop](#). Open-registration workshops will be announced on the Library Youth Services listserv and the [ORTR Facebook page](#). By-request workshops for 15-20 participants are possible; see the [ORTR website](#) for details.
- Early Literacy 101 is a free, hands-on workshop to help library staff build a firm foundation in early literacy. The online workshop includes two two-hour live sessions and approximately 2 hours of on-your-own work. Participants will learn how brain development impacts how young children learn, and will explore effective, research-based early literacy resources and activities.
- As the ongoing pandemic continues to limit opportunities for families with young children, remember that the [Day By Day Ohio Family Literacy Calendar](#) website at DayByDayOH.org features a perpetual calendar with songs, activities, book suggestions, and videos for every day of the year. Day By Day Ohio offers resources to further develop early literacy skills and improve school readiness.
 - Day By Day Ohio, a service of the State Library of Ohio in collaboration with Ohio Ready to Read, also includes literacy and health information and an Ohio public library locator map. It is available anytime, anywhere and requires just internet access and a computer, smartphone, or mobile device.

- **Consortium Service Highlights**
 - The Library Management System Support team aided Brown Memorial Library in becoming fine free.
 - The Cataloging team worked with SirsiDynix in the bibliographic database deduplication process. 4,496 exact matches were found. The team is manually reviewing and merging new matches.
 - The BlueCloud Analytics (BCA) team trained Rodman Public Library and Louisville Public Library on BCA on January 11 and January 14.
 - Nicole Brown, Brenda Michel, Jay Miley, and Misty Wycarver visited Rodman Public Library and Louisville Public Library on January 28, 2021. The purpose of the visit was to check-in with staff after the recent migration of these systems.
 - On January 6, The Enterprise Search and Discovery Catalog received numerous operating system updates and patches
 - The Louisville Public Library collection of materials was opened to allow consortium level holds on January 6. Louisville migrated to the SEO Consortium in November.
 - On January 8, Michael Postlethwait from the SEO IT Team provided a meeting to the Upper Sandusky Public Library on the Click and Collect Feature offered to the Consortium members.
 - On January 14 and 21, several SEO Team members worked on packaging up iPads and cases for SEO members participating in the IMLS iPad Project. Several of the 2020 SEO product deliverables to its members focusing on self-service checkout and the curbside click and collect feature allowed the consortium to qualify for IMLS funds under the CARES Act.
 - On January 22, the SEO Management Team met with the assigned Library Relations Manager from SirsiDynix to discuss new product offerings and any potential issues or assistance needed from the vendor.
 - The SEO Management Team attended the quarterly update meeting provided by WhoFi. An update on usage statistics and new service offerings was delivered to the group attending on January 22.
 - On January 26, SEO IT and Management met to discuss the schema to be used in the new SEO Support Desk software focusing on ease of use and navigation for customers.
 - The SEO Team had an all-staff meeting via Microsoft Teams on January 27. The staff provided updates on current individual and team projects.
 - A combined SEO and State Library team met to discuss the transition of staff files from locally hosted equipment to Microsoft OneDrive on January 27.
 - On January 28, John Stewart and Michael Postlethwait met with Consortia Leaders from RAILS and SWAN in Illinois to include product developers from SirsiDynix on a project to improve the administration of the Enterprise Search and Discovery tool called Discovery File Manager SPP.
 - SEO Management and IT Team met virtually with Freshworks for the new support desk software project meeting on January 29.

Summer Library Program/Summer Reading Program

- The full [2020 Ohio Summer Library Program Evaluation Report](#) is available for download. It is also available to be read on screen in a [digital magazine format](#). In response to the public health emergency, libraries revised and adapted their 2020 SLP plans to accommodate current safety practices and requirements. The report describes innovations, challenges, successes, and lessons learned by libraries around Ohio during a summer unlike any other. Statewide participation totals were not compiled for 2020 and are not included in the report.
- An online access code for the 2021 Collaborative Summer Library Program manual has been sent to a representative of each of Ohio's 251 public library systems. The access code may be used by all library buildings and departments in multi-location systems. Ohio public libraries' membership in CSLP and access to the online CSLP manual are fully supported by federal LSTA funds administered by the State Library of Ohio. The online manual includes the complete program manual, all artwork and downloadables, and many extra resources not available in the static manual formats.
- The 2021 CSLP slogan is "Tails and Tales." The program features animal-themed artwork by [Salina Yoon](#).

Transforming Teen Services

- The Young Adult Library Services Association (YALSA) is leading a nationwide training initiative to support and elevate teen services in libraries and other learning environments. Transforming Teen Services integrates connected learning, computational thinking, and youth development to help librarians build responsive services for and with teens. A national cohort includes teams of trainers from 46 states; Washington, DC; and the Northern Mariana Islands. Ohio's team consists of: Kristin Wilson, Loudonville Public Library; Steve Moser, Dayton Metro Library; and Janet Ingraham Dwyer, State Library of Ohio.
- After planned trainings across Ohio were interrupted by the public health emergency, Ohio's team developed a four-session, six-hour online Transforming Teen Services course. The fourth cohort of this course is currently meeting.
