Guiding Ohio Online

- [Guiding Ohio Online](#) is a State Library-administered competitive LSTA (Library Services and Technology Act) grant. The purpose of the grant is to allow libraries serving rural populations in Ohio to hire a dedicated technology trainer for their library. The technology trainer is hired as an independent contractor in a full- or part-time capacity depending on the needs of the library for a one-year period.

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

LSTA

- The State Library invited all library types to apply for the [2020-2021 Competitive Grant](#) program. The application period closed on October 2, 2020. Applications are currently being reviewed, with recommendations for funding to be made at the December 2020 State Library of Ohio Board meeting. Applicants could request up to \$50,000 in federal funds, and all projects must have included a 25% local cash match of the total project cost. Proposals for Ohio LSTA Competitive Grants had to fall within the following four categories:
 - Data Management and Analytics
 - Literacy
 - Outreach and Partnerships
 - STEM (or STEAM)

A lakeside library

Even before the pandemic struck, Lorain (Ohio) Public Library System (LPLS) was hatching a scheme to use the outdoors as a way of attracting more patrons. Now, during COVID-19 times, that plan is proving particularly apropos.

In a partnership with Lorain County Metro Parks, Lorain County Public Health, and the State Library of Ohio, LPLS purchased a shipping container, placed it across from a beach in nearby Lakeview Park, equipped it with sports and exercise equipment, and operated it in July and August as the "Little Library on the Lake."

Bexley Public Library now loans original artwork

Bexley Public Library patrons can now check out works by Franklin County artists for the same loan periods as books, DVDs and other materials. The Bexley Art Library debuted with an Oct. 4 outdoor event at the library, 2411 E. Main St.

...Schneider [Librarian Leann Schneider] said she proposed the idea of the Bexley Art Library to library Director Ben Heckman, based on a circulating art program at the Akron-Summit County Public Library.

...Each of the artists was paid a \$400 purchase fee, covered by grants from the Ohio Arts Council, the Bexley Community Foundation's Susie & Charlie Rath Creative Arts Fund and the State Library of Ohio, Schneider said.

PLUS (Public Libraries Uniting in Service) will allow a greater level of cooperation and resource sharing between the five member libraries for the benefit of all patrons in Columbiana County. Inter-county Interlibrary loan borrowing and lending of materials will be easier and faster than ever before. There will be more access to drop off sites as a patron can return an item to any of the member libraries.

...The member libraries are grateful to the State Library of Ohio and the Institute of Museum and Library Services. This cooperative project was "funded in part through a federal Institute of Museum and Library Services LSTA grant awarded by the State Library of Ohio." Notre Dame College Library Receives Grant to Enhance Environment, COVID Precautions

The Notre Dame College Clara Fritzsche Library has been awarded a State of Ohio Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) CARES Mini-Grant to purchase professional, protective equipment, support materials and other resources to facilitate safe and effective service during the COVID-19 pandemic.

... "This grant will assist us in providing a safe and seamless library experience for the Notre Dame campus community," said Karen Zoller, director of the College's Clara Fritzsche Library.

...With the support of the State Library of Ohio and federal funds from the IMLS, Notre Dame will purchase safety-minded, electronic peripherals including washable keyboards. The grant also will allow the library space to add plexiglass shields as partitions between workstations and new, modular furniture to support physical distancing.

VWCS library receives grant in response to COVID-19
Van-Wert, September 19, 2020

Van Wert City Schools Library was recently awarded a \$3,000 CARES Act Mini-Grant to help its student libraries prevent, prepare for, and respond to the COVID-19 pandemic. The purpose of this grant is to help libraries across the state by purchasing items and materials including, but not limited to curbside service signage, furniture to

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support social distancing, remote learning platforms, and storage bins for safe material handling.

Nellie Schmidt, VWCS Media Specialist, is planning to use the funds to purchase e-books and audiobooks for students in the elementary, middle, and high schools to encourage reading even when a physical book may not be available to check out.

...Accounts have been created for students through apps provided by the schools. Elementary school students use a service called MackinVIA, while high school and middle school students use Sora. Along with the ability to check out digital books from VWCS, high school and middle school accounts are directly linked to the Ohio Digital Library through the Brumback Library when using the Sora app. This allows students to access e-books and audiobooks that are filtered specifically for teens and young adults.

Ohio Digital Library

- Through November 30, 2020, ODL has tallied 6,140,945 checkouts. This is the first time in its existence that ODL has exceeded six million checkouts. In fact, in all of 2019, ODL's circulation was 5,628,889.
- In mid-March, ODL enabled the opportunity for Ohioans to take advantage of the Overdrive [Instant Digital Card](#). A user can sign up with his/her phone number and gain quick access to e-content via ODL. Users that sign up via the Instant Digital Card will be directed to their local library to fill out a physical library card. In November 2020, 5,009 registrations have taken place.

Ohio Digital Network [Digital Public Library of America (DPLA) Project]

- Through November, the Ohio Digital Network (ODN) now has over 234,300 items on [dp.la](#) from 24 active contributors.
- ODN and the State Library launched a [Metadata Mini-Grant program](#), to empower libraries and museums to prepare their collections for the [Digital Public Library of America](#). Libraries could apply for up to \$4,999 in federal LSTA funds to prepare collections for DPLA. The application period for this grant initiative closed on November 2, 2020, and applications are currently being reviewed.

 - DPLA launched the [Black Women's Suffrage Portal](#) on September 8. The Black Women's Suffrage Digital Collection is a collaborative project to provide digital access to materials documenting the roles and experiences of Black Women in the Women's Suffrage Movement and, more broadly, women's rights, voting rights, and civic activism between the 1850s and 1960. To celebrate the launch, DPLA held a [webinar on the importance of curating Black Collections](#), and included information on the [Harmful Language Statement](#) crafted by the DPLA Metadata Working Group.
 - ODN is proud of its summer webinar series, "What the Wiki," which focused on Wikipedia and digital library collections. Recordings for these three webinars can be found on the Ohio Digital Network's [YouTube channel](#).

Ohio Ready to Read

- The Ohio Ready to Read (ORTR) trainers have developed an online version of the popular [Early Literacy 101 workshop](#). Open-registration workshops will be announced on the Library Youth Services listserv and the [ORTR Facebook page](#). By-request workshops for 15-20 participants are possible; see the [ORTR website](#) for details.
- Early Literacy 101 is a free, hands-on workshop to help library staff build a firm foundation in early literacy. The online workshop includes two two-hour live sessions and approximately 2 hours of on-your-own work. Participants will learn how brain development impacts how young children learn, and will explore effective, research-based early literacy resources and activities.
- As the ongoing pandemic continues to limit opportunities for families with young children, remember that the [Day By Day Ohio Family Literacy Calendar](#) website at DayByDayOH.org features a perpetual calendar with songs, activities, book suggestions, and videos for every day of the year. Day By Day Ohio offers resources to further develop early literacy skills and improve school readiness.
 - Day By Day Ohio, a service of the State Library of Ohio in collaboration with Ohio Ready to Read, also includes literacy and health information and an Ohio public library locator map. It is available anytime, anywhere and requires just internet access and a computer, smartphone, or mobile device.



Summer Library Program/Summer Reading Program

- A **preliminary 2020 Ohio Summer Library Program (SLP) evaluation report** is available: <https://library.ohio.gov/documents/2020-ohio-summer-library-program-preliminary-report>
 - Most Ohio public libraries were able to offer SLP, and those that didn't made their decisions thoughtfully and with public safety in mind. A large majority of survey respondents said they considered their 2020 SLP a success, given the circumstances. Libraries statewide implemented many new emergency practices that were so successful that they will become standard practice. Library staff creativity, flexibility, and resilience made it possible for Ohio's libraries to engage, support, and comfort their communities in a pandemic.
 - A fuller report, including anecdotes and analysis from Ohio librarians, will be available by year's end.
- An online access code for the 2021 Collaborative Summer Library Program manual has been sent to a representative of each of Ohio's 251 public library systems. The access code may be used by all library buildings and departments in multi-location systems. Ohio public libraries' membership in CSLP and access to the online CSLP manual are fully supported by federal LSTA funds administered by the State Library of Ohio. The online manual includes the complete program manual, all artwork and downloadables, and many extra resources not available in the static manual formats.
 - The 2021 CSLP slogan is "Tails and Tales." The program features animal-themed artwork by [Salina Yoon](#).

Transforming Teen Services

- The Young Adult Library Services Association (YALSA) is leading a nationwide training initiative to support and elevate teen services in libraries and other learning environments. Transforming Teen Services integrates connected learning, computational thinking, and youth development to help librarians build responsive services for and with teens. A national cohort includes teams of trainers from 46 states, Washington DC, and the Northern Mariana Islands. Ohio's team consists of: Kristin Wilson, Loudonville Public Library; Steve Moser, Dayton Metro Library; and Janet Ingraham Dwyer, State Library of Ohio.
- After planned trainings across Ohio were interrupted by the public health emergency, Ohio's team developed a four-session, six-hour online Transforming Teen Services course. The third cohort of this course is currently meeting. 

WebJunction

- There was a total of 134 WebJunction course completions and webinar attendees in November 2020—up from 110 in October. Significant trends in the popularity of courses were not evident with 81 different courses completed and 2 webinars. Attendees represented all types of libraries with 105 from Public, 13 Academic, 4 from Special, 4 from School, 4 from Independent Research, 1 from a State Agency, and 2 from none of the above.
