The award is for innovative and collaborative librarians and related professionals who are new to their field or are in the early years of the profession.

Census 2020

- The first meeting of the Ohio Library 2020 Census Committee took place on November 19. The committee aims to provide resources to public, school, academic, and special libraries to help them navigate the process. Libraries are essential to every community, campus, student, and patron that comes through its doors or connects online. Library staff can use their trusted role to answer questions, provide resources, and educate their users about the importance of the Census.

This Census 2020-focused web page will provide libraries and library staff with the resources they need to be prepared for Census programming, outreach, and patron questions. It provides a wealth of information and links including a Census timeline, dispelling Census myths, marketing and promotional tools, and potential partners. Summer Library Program/Summer Reading Program

- The 2020 theme for the Collaborative Summer Library Program's (CSLP) summer program is "Imagine Your Story," with artwork by LeUyen Pham, illustrator of *The Princess in Black*, *Real Friends*, *Grace for President*, and many other picture books and middle grade books. This is the first time that artwork for all age groups, early literacy through adult, was created by the same artist. Please note that certain elements of this artwork have been deemed problematic for the depiction of Native American sacred symbols alongside folktale and fairy tale elements. A message has been sent to the SLP contact person at each public library system regarding this situation; you may also read this [statement from CSLP](#).
- The [Ohio Summer Library Program website](#) has been updated with information about the 2020 program. Expect additional updates through the fall and winter, as workshops are scheduled and other resources made available.
- CSLP has ended its relationship with an exclusive vendor for products and is now working directly with a contracted design house. The online catalog is available at shopcslp.com. Products depicting the Native elements have been removed from the online shop, but all other products are in-stock and ready to ship.
- CSLP has also completed a substantial revision of its Rules of Use. One big change is that public libraries **may now use CSLP artwork and slogans on all paper items** that are created in-house or through other vendors. Public libraries are also no longer restricted in how long they may use CSLP artwork, and CSLP is now retaining ownership of all art provided by the artists to CSLP for its programs. - All Ohio public libraries may use CSLP themes and materials but are not required to do so. The State Library of Ohio supports your summer library program regardless of its theme and content. - The 2020 Take 5 event will take place on Friday, May 1 at the Columbus Metropolitan Library's Main Library, with optional activities on Thursday, April 30. Registration is expected to open in January.
