## Choose to Read Ohio

- **A New School Year: Stories in Six Voices** by Sally Derby, illustrated by Mika Song, has been selected as the third annual Choose to Read Ohio (CTRO) "**Floyd's Pick**" title, in memory of children's literature expert, advocate, and librarian Floyd Dickman. Each year, the CTRO Advisory Council selects an outstanding book in Ohio children's literature to be Floyd's Pick. - The 2019 & 2020 [Choose to Read Ohio](#) booklist will be unveiled in conjunction with the [Ohioana Book Festival](#), which takes place on Saturday, April 14, 2018. Fifty-seven Ohio librarians, educators, and reading advocates helped to select the titles for the new booklist, which features notable books by Ohio authors and illustrators, for all ages and a wide variety of reading interests. ## Library Leadership Ohio

- The State Library and OhioNET are collaborating on Library Leadership Ohio (LLO). The mission of LLO is to “create the next generation of transformative library leaders.” Thirty-two individuals from all types of libraries participate in each LLO cohort. Facilitated by the Ivy Library Group, LLO 2018 will take place July 17-20, 2018 at the Quest Conference Center and Four Points by Sheraton at Polaris.
- Seventy-six applications were received, making this the largest pool of applicants since LLO was renewed in 2012. The 2018 cohort will be comprised of 19 public librarians, 11 academic librarians, 1 school and 1 special librarian.

## LSTA

- Libraries may apply for an Open Grant at any time. Information on Open Grants can be found at: <https://library.ohio.gov/services-for-libraries/lsta-grants/#AvailableGrants>.
- Open Grants were awarded to West Muskingum Schools and Belmont County District Library.
- The State Library will once again be collaborating with the Ohio Preservation Council on a Conservation Care Class and LSTA grant opportunity. In order to apply for a grant, an institution must attend the class to be held June 14 at the State Library. Workshop registration will be posted the first week of April.

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- Automation proposals that will allow a public library currently on a stand-alone ILS to migrate and join a consortium are still being accepted. A packet containing the RFP and a list of ILS consortia accepting new members was sent last summer to public library directors currently using a stand-alone ILS. Applications may be submitted at any time, and recommended proposals will be taken to the State Library Board for approval at the next available meeting.
- Application materials for the second year of the LSTA-funded Guiding Ohio Online program are now available. The application deadline is May 18, 2018. Informational sessions on the program and the application process have been scheduled for April and May. ## Ohio Deaf History Month

- The General Assembly of the State of Ohio has designated the period beginning March 13 and ending April 15 as Ohio Deaf History Month.
- The Ohio Digital Library has a wealth of resources in the areas of Deaf culture and American Sign Language. These materials are available at <https://ohdbks.overdrive.com/collection/113719>.
- Ohio libraries are encouraged to recognize Deaf History Month by displaying materials and offering programs to highlight the significance of the many outstanding contributions made by deaf and hearing pioneers, particularly in the area of Deaf Education. These include:
  - April 15, 1817: The American School for the Deaf (ASD), the oldest permanent school for the deaf in the United States, was founded in Hartford, Connecticut by Thomas Hopkins.
  - April 8, 1864: Congress authorized the institution now known as Gallaudet University to confer college degrees and President Abraham Lincoln signed the bill into law.
  - March 13, 1988: the Deaf President Now (DPN) movement led to the appointment of Gallaudet University's first deaf president, Dr. I. King Jordan.

## Ohio Digital Network [Digital Public Library of America (DPLA) Project]

- Over 94,000 records from the Ohio Digital Network hub are now published on [DPLA's website](#).
- A survey was sent out to identify institutions in Phase 2 and beyond. After the results are compiled, ODN will work with Phase 2 institutions to complete partnership agreements and begin harvesting records.
- Jen Johnson, Penelope Shumaker, Peter Kukla, and Missy Lodge attended the DPLA Hubs Meeting in March in Atlanta. The two-day meeting provided updates on current DPLA initiatives, an overview of future DPLA plans, as well as break-out sessions ranging from Rights Statements, primary source sets, and governance among others. State Library staff will be sharing information with the ODN community.
- With a grant from DPLA and the Knight foundation, ODN has been able to begin work with a design agency to create a website and logo. Stay tuned for details on the new website.

## Ohio Talking Book Program

- The National Library Service (NLS) launched a national television and radio campaign designed to educate key audiences about the services provided by NLS. NLS is a free braille and talking book library service for people with temporary or permanent low vision, blindness, or a physical disability that prevents them from reading or holding the printed page. Through a [national network of cooperating libraries](#), NLS offers books the way you want them: in braille or audio, mailed to your door for free or instantly downloadable. The Ohio Library for the Blind and Physically Disabled (OLBPD) in partnership with the State Library of Ohio administer the NLS service to eligible borrowers in the State of Ohio.
- The first round of commercials will be advertised on national outlets including National Public Radio, the History Channel and the Hallmark Channel, to name a few.
